

Unwrap the gifts of the Holy Spirit

At Baptism, we receive seven special gifts from the Holy Spirit. They are strengthened at Confirmation. These gifts are given to us and our children to help us live as followers of Jesus. They help us to build up the Body of Christ, to

respond to the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives, to make good choices, and to serve God and others. When we make children aware of these gifts, they can fully unwrap and use them

throughout their lives:

Wisdom – Allows us to grow in understanding and to better judge all with which we are challenged because of our relationship with God.

Understanding – Gives us a deeper insight into our faith and into Sacred Scripture.

Right Judgment or Counsel – Opens our hearts to God's voice and make choices to live as a follower of Jesus.

Fortitude – Strengthens us to follow our conscience and convictions no matter the cost.

Knowledge –
Enables us to
correctly judge
truths of faith and
choose the right
path to lead to
God.

Piety – Leads to a genuine love and devotion for

God and religious observance.

Fear of the Lord – Inspires us to be constantly in awe of God and respectfully aware of our dependence upon him. "Blessed is the man who fears the Lord, who greatly delights in his commandments" (Psalm 112:1).



Why do Catholics honor the saints?

A saint is someone who the Church recognizes as having lived a life of heroic virtue. We honor the saints because we want to follow their example. The saints weren't extraordinary because they were "special," but

because they let God work in them and through them. Like them, we are called to live in friendship with

God, to practice virtue, and become holy. Finally, by honoring the saints we also honor God, who created them and inspired


others through them.

"As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."

In a time when it was a challenge to follow God's way, Joshua made a deliberate declaration that he and his family would serve the Lord (Joshua 24:15). Here are some ways you and your house can know and serve the Lord:

Family prayer time. At least once a day, pray as a family. Consider the format P-R-A-Y: Praise God for his goodness, Repent of the times you failed to love God or each other, Ask for the things you need, Yield and listen for God's voice.

Participate in your parish. Make a point of taking your children to First Friday observances, feast days, and May crownings. These are wonderful expressions of our Catholic spirituality.



Luke 21:25-28, 34-36, the hope of Advent

Advent is the time when we wait for the coming of Christ. God has promised that if we are faithful to him during this wait, we will be

rewarded. In this reading, Jesus urges us to remain alert while still on Earth. He said that the pleasures and comforts of this world can tempt us to sin and he wants us to avoid sin at all costs.

When Jesus described "||||'| the end times, what he said was scary. People will die of fright because "the power of the heavens" will be shaken.

It's not that Jesus wanted to scare us unnecessarily but he wanted us

to understand that sin is serious business. Its effects last forever.

What can a parent
do? It's not always easy
to do the right thing
but it is always worth
it. Remind your
children that God sees
all that we do and
knows each time we

choose right over sin. When we work hard to obey Jesus, we can be calm and without fear when we finally meet him knowing that we will be rewarded.



November 1 – All Saints Day. Because of the persecution of the early Church, there were more saints than available feast days to celebrate them. Pope Gregory IV designated Nov.1 as All Saints Day, to honor the saints.

November 2 – All Souls Day. On this day we pray for the dead, especially our loved ones and souls in Purgatory. Our prayers and sacrifices can help them get to Heaven faster.

November 13 – St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (1917). Mother Cabrini started the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart in Italy and founded 67

institutions to care for the sick and forgotten in Europe and the Americas. She died in Chicago, and was the first U.S. citizen to be canonized a saint.

November 29 - 1st Sunday of Advent. During this four-week season, we anticipate Christ's birth and his coming on the last day. Catholics around the world light candles in an Advent wreath each night of Advent to signal the coming of the light of

Christ.



I wanted to make prayer a priority at home, but it seemed like there was always some event or errand that would get in the way.

One afternoon, Kara went over to a friend's house for a play date. At seven

o'clock, everyone stopped what they were doing to spend an hour in prayer: thirty minutes for spiritual reading and thirty minutes for the family Rosary. Everyone took
